They were told that their child would not survive, that termination was their best choice. Desperate for another option, the Thompson family found Dell Children's, our Fetal and Heart Centers and Dr. Charles Fraser.

Holtin Thompson was born in March 2023 in the Dell Children's Specialized Delivery Unit and underwent immediate, life-saving heart surgery. He quickly began to grow and thrive. **Holtin turns two this spring, and his health and his family represent the exact purpose of Dell Children's HERE Campaign.**

Without the visionary growth of Dell Children's over the past 5 years, we would not have been ready to care for Holtin. His parents would have had to seek care far away from home. Things could have been very different for this precious baby and his family.

Investing where it matters most



The Fetal Center has begun to expand fetal imaging resources for Central Texas as they are the only program to offer Fetal MRIs and have recently begun offering fetal echocardiograms last year.



The embedded psychosocial team at the Fetal Center is dedicated to removing barriers to care for their patients. Whether it is the utilization of a travel fund to aid patients and families to afford travel to Austin or lodging once here, or thoughtful and thorough navigation of resources for families facing hardship with copays or lack of insurance.



The Fetal Center performed their first EXIT Procedure this year. This procedure is highly specialized and only three Fetal Centers in Texas, including Dell Children's, can do them. This procedure is performed when a baby's airway is blocked prior to delivery and they will not be able to breathe once they leave the placenta. Dell Children's fetal surgeons partially delivered this baby, allowing them to preserve critical circulation while our team secured the baby's airway, over a 60-90 minute window.



AN AMBITIOUS GOAL RIGHT HERE AT HOME

Dell Children's Foundation launched HERE Campaign fundraising efforts in 2019, and an ambitious \$90 million dollar goal set the stage for the largest campaign in the Foundation's history.

The Michael & Susan Dell Foundation committed to a **\$30 million matching grant** for the advancement of pediatric care in Central Texas in support of Dell Children's HERE Campaign for growth. Because of this generosity, the impact of our partner's investments have gone further, ensuring quality specialty care for children right here, at home.

This comprehensive campaign successfully raised critical funds for three key areas; capital, program, and endowment. Capital funding led to the construction and opening of new cutting edge facilities expanding the hospital's capacity and providing spaces and state of the art equipment for the most advanced specialty care. Program funding established and expanded the following Centers of Excellence: the Texas Center for Pediatric and Congenital Heart Disease, the UT Health Austin Pediatric Neurosciences Program, the Children's Blood and Cancer Center, and the Comprehensive Fetal Care Center.

Perhaps the most important part of these acclaimed Centers of Excellence are the people. **HERE Campaign programmatic funds have helped to recruit world class physicians** across these key areas. These visionary leaders have inspired supporters to ensure their work will be perpetually sustained for years to come with the establishment of Dell Children's first ever Endowed Chairs. We know this is just the exciting beginning of so much more to come.



Grace's Story

Grace Jennings was born with a congenital heart defect that required multiple cardiac operations early in life. In September 2019, Grace became the first pediatric patient in Central Texas to undergo the implantation of a left ventricular assist device (LVAD), which is a mechanical pump that supports the circulation and partially replaces heart function in people who have weakened hearts.

For 15 months, Grace was connected to a battery pack and controller that stored the LVAD while waiting for a heart transplant at her home. She attended school and remained active at home while being supported by the LVAD. However, on December 9, 2020 Grace was airlifted to Dell Children's after suffering a brain hemorrhage. She remained in the intensive care unit at Dell Children's until she received her donor heart.

Due to Grace's complex medical history, her unique anatomy and a multitude of past operations, she was not able to receive a heart transplant at other healthcare facilities. **Dell Children's cardiac surgical team has been committed to providing the best possible outcome for this remarkable little girl,** first with the LVAD, and 15 months later with a heart transplant.

Grace has an indomitable spirit, and she's determined to get better and stronger everyday.

Will's Story

On Sunday, February 3rd, 2019, Will Allen and his father, Tim, were leaving baseball practice when they were involved in a near fatal, head-on collision auto accident. Tim had just returned home to Dripping Springs after his mother's funeral, and was ready to be back home with his family. Will, who was only seven years old at the time, had just entered the select baseball world and was a focused and fierce competitor. They were headed home from baseball practice to go watch the Super Bowl with his family when the head on collision happened.

When help arrived at the traumatic scene, Will was taken to Dell Children's Medical Center where the family learned he suffered a spinal cord injury and was paralyzed from right below the chest down. Following surgery, Will was moved to the inpatient rehabilitation unit where he started his road to recovery. He remained at the hospital for 6 weeks where he worked with speech, occupational, and physical therapists who all saw Will's resilience each day. When he was released from the hospital, Will didn't look back and faced the challenges of his new life head-on.

Five years later, Will is doing exceptionally well! Wheelchair basketball has provided him an outlet for competition and remaining active. He goes to therapy weekly and the ultimate goal remains to one day stand and walk again. For everyone that knows Will, they know and believe it will happen one day. He's a kid that has incredible spirit, strength and determination. He's a kid that has inspired all that know him with the way he's handled his situation. As he told his dad, "Dad I wouldn't change anything, this is the path that has been chosen for me." He's his family's hero and they are so proud of the young man he's becoming. The future for Will is bright and the progress the family has made since this accident would never have been possible without the amazing support from family, friends and our community.

Charlotte's Story

Charli is almost five, but the past three years have felt much longer for the Hilz family. Their world took a dramatic turn when she began experiencing seizures at just two years old. "They pretty quickly diagnosed her with epilepsy," Charli's mother, Mackenzie, recalls. Charli was experiencing up to 20 seizures a day, many appearing as brief absences or moments where she seemed to "space out." She even had a 25-minute seizure that only went away after a visit to the ER of another hospital where doctors initially downplayed the severity of her condition.

Things changed when Mackenzie's aunt, a doctor at Dell Children's, connected them with Dr. Dave Clarke, Chief of the Dell Children's Comprehensive Pediatric Epilepsy Center at DCMC. The real breakthrough came when Dr. Clarke pinpointed the cause of Charli's seizures—a small coil in her brain that had formed incorrectly in utero. Since her surgeries, Charli's progress has been nothing short of miraculous. "Dr. Clarke gave us our lives back," Mackenzie says, her voice filled with gratitude.

Holtin's Story

Kate and Tucker Thompson were expecting their first baby boy in March of 2023. During an ultrasound, they discovered a heart defect and heard news no parent wants to hear. Holtin was diagnosed in utero with a congenital heart defect called Hypoplastic Left Heart Syndrome (HLHS), where the left ventricle does not fully develop in utero. HLHS is 100% fatal if no intervention takes place.

They later learned that Holtin had another complication at hand called TAPVR (total anomalous pulmonary venous return), where the veins that bring blood from the lungs back to the heart do not properly hook up to the heart. To treat HLHS, Holtin would eventually need three open heart surgeries in the first few years of life. Holtin's diagnosis was extremely complex and critical. Despite this, his parents remained strong and faithful and did everything they could to find him the best care. This led them to Dell Children's Medical Center.

In the weeks following his diagnosis, Kate and Tucker met with both the Texas Center for Pediatric and Congenital

Heart Disease and the Comprehensive Fetal Care Center at Dell Children's. They uprooted their lives in Canyon Lake, Texas to make Austin their temporary home for the months to come.

On March 3, 2023, their miracle boy arrived. He was born at Dell Children's Special Delivery Unit via planned c-section. At three days old, Holtin went in for his first of three openheart surgeries. His recovery over the next few months was nothing short of a miracle. **Through many ups and** downs, Holtin was defying all odds and quickly earned the nickname "Little Lion." He was and is a fighter. Holtin went on to have his second open-heart surgery on July 28, 2023 and went home just three weeks later.

He and his parents remain close to Dell Children's, but are savoring every moment with their boy at 'home'. They spend countless hours staring at him in awe of all that he has accomplished in his first few months of life. Kate and Tucker are forever grateful for the amazing care they received at Dell Children's.



"I'll never forget, before her surgery, she couldn't color inside the lines. Two days after we got home, she was coloring perfectly—it was like this barrier in her brain was gone."

Much of Charli's remarkable recovery is credited to the care she received at Dell Children's Medical Center. The family felt supported at every step, from Dr. Clarke's expert guidance to the compassionate nurses and staff.

From Dr. Clarke to the guard at the front of the hospital, we felt like our hands were being held the whole time.

Jackson's Story

Jackson was a happy, easygoing and sporty 3 year old, when he started to complain of leg pain. He then started experiencing intense leg pain that would wake him in the middle of the night. After about 2 sleepless nights and follow ups, the thought was that Jackson had viral arthritis, which is sometimes a side effect after having strep. Jackson was treated with pain relievers and seemed to recover - until the sleepless nights returned 2 weeks later, with Jackson even calling out "It's in my bones!" Back to the doctor he went, where after a negative Strep test and a normal CBC panel Jackson's doctor thought it might be growing pains, but to cover all bases ordered an x-ray.

It was on August 16, 2021 that the Limburg's lives were turned upside down with x-ray results showing a growth on Jackson's left femur. On September 28th, the Limburg's received the call from Dr. Neff at the Dell Children's Blood and Cancer Center that it was **Burkitt Lymphoma**, a form of fast growing non-Hodgkin's lymphoma that impairs immunity and is rapidly fatal if left untreated. Jackson's medical team at Dell Children's wasted no time and his treatment began immediately! Over the course of six months, Jackson received 5 rounds of treatment which consisted of chemotherapy, lumbar punctures, transfusions, infusions, oral medications, and steroids, spending the majority of those months' inpatient at Dell Children's on 4 North and at the Blood & Cancer Center.

The Limburg's are so grateful for everyone who took the absolute BEST care of Jackson, making him feel like being at the hospital was an adventure, including a never ending supply of toys and snacks, visits to the fish pond to feed the cov fish and Patrolling 4N in one of the little vehicles; making the nurses, doctors and other staff laugh as he made his rounds.

On March 4, 2022 Jackson received his remission diagnosis and the Limburg's couldn't be more excited to be on the other side of this journey. However, it was bittersweet knowing they wouldn't be spending as much time at Dell with all their friends they have come to know and love. Jackson will have guarterly follow-ups and afterwards he makes sure to stop by and say hello to his friends on 4 North. The Limburg's want them to know they will never forget them!


